

Speakers... and Topics

Rollin Woolley, "The Gardens and Landscapes at Carter's Grove."

Mr. Woolley has been with the Colonial Williamsburg landscape department for fourteen years where he currently supervises the landscapes for the museum properties. Graduating as a horticulturist from North Carolina State, Rollin also earned an M.A. in Education from Virginia Tech. Before coming to Colonial Williamsburg, Rollin was an agricultural agent with the Virginia Extension Service.

Rollin will address the challenges of interpreting and maintaining the many and diverse landscapes at Carter's Grove Plantation which span three centuries and which include a house museum, a reconstructed settlement, a large vegetable garden, lawns, orchards, pastures and field crops.

Ann Crossman, "The Garden at Bacon's Castle."

Ms. Crossman's academic work was completed at The College of William and Mary where she obtained her B.A. in Colonial American Studies in 1979, and her M.A. in Museum Education in 1984. Ann has worked in museum education for more than ten years, and is currently Curator of Education for the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities where she is responsible for providing educational services to all branches of the organization.

Since aquiring Bacon's Castle in 1973, The APVA has pursued a program of research and restoration relating to the house and grounds which has shed new light on old questions and illuminated many new questions as yet unanswered. Miss Crossman will explore these old and new questions in preparation for your visit to Bacon's Castle.

Gordon Chappell, "Colonial Gardens: A Williamsburg Perspective."

Mr. Chappell is Director of Landscape and Facilities for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation. He is a registered landscape architect, a member of the American Society of Landscape Architects, and is a graduate of the University of Georgia School of Environmental Design.

In this presentation, Gordon will share with you some of the pleasures, insights, traditions and, and of course, the history that he has encountered in Colonial Williamsburg's gardens, as well as discuss what he sees to be the priorities for the future of these historic landscapes.
