

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

For the first time the Southern Garden History Society will hold its annual meeting in New Orleans, a city long celebrated for its multi-faceted history, its architecture and food, and the beauty of its lush gardens. Meetings will take place in the historic French Quarter, complemented by walking tours to see the Quarter's intimate walled gardens. Lecturers will discuss native plants and the development of horticulture and landscape design in the region from the 18th through the 20th centuries.

The study of 20th-century southern plants-women, begun at last year's meeting in Atlanta, will continue with discussions of Louisianian Caroline Dorman (1888-1971) and her home Briarwood, her botanical illustrations and correspondence, and her mission to establish the Kisatchie National Forest near Natchitoches.

Friday's meeting will take place at the Williams Research Center (WRC) of The Historic New Orleans Collection. The WRC, a 1915 Beaux-Arts-style structure by architect Edgar Angelo Christy, formerly served as a police station and municipal courthouse. The Saturday meeting will be held in a property of the Louisiana State Museum.
