ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

In 2003 the SGHS returns to Atlanta, the site of its 1983 inaugural meeting. The conference also coincides with the height of dogwood season and the 67th annual Dogwood Festival in Piedmont Park. Your travels around the city are assured to be against an urban backdrop of spring flowering plants and shrubs.

Lectures will address Atlanta's verdant garden and landscape history with particular attention to its early 20th-century legacy. Neel Reid and Philip Shutze, two of Atlanta's most notable architects, as well as Fredrick Law Olmsted and others who have contributed to Atlanta's landscape legacy will be discussed. Saturday's garden tours will include a variety of historic and contemporary gardens.

ATLANTA HISTORY CENTER

The meeting will be headquartered at the Atlanta History Center (AHC), the city's premier history museum offering award-winning exhibits about Atlanta and the South, thirty-three acres of gardens, the historic Tullie Smith and Swan Houses, and the Cherokee Garden Library, Center for the Study of Southern Garden History. FRIDAY, APRIL 11

MORNING

Registration opens at 10 am at the AHC's McElreath Hall and will be available all day. Shuttles will run continuously between the AHC and the Hampton Inn from 9:30–1:30. Lunch, on your own, is available at the AHC's cafe or Swan Coach House as well as many nearby restaurants.

Before the conference begins, be sure to experience the AHC's diverse gardens. Philip Shutze designed both the 1928 Swan House and its surrounding landscape including an Italianate Boxwood Garden. The c. 1845 Tullie Smith House, surrounding outbuildings and period landscape depict a pre-Civil War yeoman farm of the Piedmont. Other gardens include the Quarry Garden, which showcases Georgia native plants; the Cherry Sims Garden, containing Japanese plants and their American counterparts; the Rhododendron Garden, sure to be in splendid bloom; and the 10-acre Swan Woods Trail, which demonstrates the ecological succession of the Piedmont region.

Access to the AHC's gardens, historic houses, and exhibits is included in your registration fee, simply show your badge. Schedule timed tours of the Swan and Tullie Smith Houses at the ticket counter in museum building.

The program officially begins at 1:00 at the AHC's McElreath Hall with a series of lectures. Refreshments will be provided mid-afternoon.

AFTERNOON

After a box lunch, we will tour some of Atlanta's Northside Gardens and experience a vary of styles, history, and designers. Refreshments will be provided.

BELMAN-KORANDO GARDEN

This new garden was chosen on the merits of its exceptional design, integrating numerous outdoor rooms furnished with garden antiques into a unified whole.

JOHNSTON-GILBERT GARDEN

This is one of the few remaining Atlanta gardens designed in the 1920s by Philadelphia landscape architect Robert Cridland. The garden was expanded in 1930 by W. C. Hunter and is featured in the *Garden History of Georgia*.

PATTERSON-CARR GARDEN

Philip Shutze, who designed both the house and gardens in 1940, produced "a garden view from every room." Later garden modifications were completed by Ed Daugherty and Ryan Gainey.

RICHARSON-ALLEN GARDEN

Broadlands was designed by New York architect Aymar Embury in the 1920s as a country estate. Located on an elevated site overlooking Nancy Creek, it is surrounded by a series of box-bordered terraces, formal gardens, shaded valleys, and native forests.

SHELTON-WALDEN GARDEN

Dargan Landscape Architects recently extended and elaborated Neel Reid's 1925-26 terraced garden in the French formal style with their signature design details.

EVENING

The conference culminates with a festive dinner at the Cherokee Town Club and the SGHS Business Meeting.

The Cherokee Town Club is one of Atlanta's finest, private clubs. The building was originally the home of the Grant family who referred to the house as Craigellachie. Designed by prominent Atlanta architect Walter T. Downing in 1914 and completed in 1919, the 20,000 square foot home contained 23 rooms.

BANKSHAVEN, NEWNAN, GEORGIA

In 1928 William Banks Sr. commissioned William C. Pauley, one of the first practicing landscape architects in Atlanta, to design the grounds of his new estate. Today, Bankshaven's landscape remains largely unchanged. A series of formal gardens surround the c. 1828 Federal-style Gordon-Blount House (designed by Daniel Pratt), including a fountain garden, Venetian poolhouse and pavilion, maze-patterned boxwood garden, and a walled garden. Completed in 1931, the high point of the garden remains the picturesque vista from the house across the terraced lawn toward Pearl Lake.

HILLS & DALES, LAGRANGE, GEORGIA

The Fuller Callaway House, "Hills and Dales," considered by many to be Neel Reid's finest work, was built between 1914 and 1916 on the grounds of the Ferrell Gardens. Beginning in the 1840s, Sarah Ferrell developed an elaborate parterre garden with terraces and boxwood-bordered beds. The intricate boxwood gardens are so complex that a map is essential to interpreting the symbols and inscriptions such as "God is Love" and "Fiat Justitia."
